


DONATE LIFE CONNECTICUT ANNUAL REPORT 2024

A Message from the Executive Director

Donate Life Connecticut (DLC) is dedicated to educating and raising awareness among all Connecticut residents about the lifesaving and life-enhancing benefits of organ and tissue donation. We are also dedicated to increasing the number of registered organ donors and champions of living donation.

In 2024, we started the year with a very special early screening event of the Lionsgate Film "Ordinary Angels," starring Hilary Swank. We not only filled a theater at the Plainville AMC, but we also invited living donor Lawrence Lewis from Vermont to surprise his recipient, 5-yearold Raul Torres, and the Torres family before the film began. The heartwarming surprise meeting was caught on camera and film, and a story on WFSB aired that evening.

In April, we created a photo series for Donate Life Month called "Gentle Strength: Images of Generosity, Hope & New Life." The series featured 30 people affected by transplant and donation. Each black and white image was featured with its personal story during the month of April. The series was also displayed on the screens throughout the Hartford Healthcare system, at the West Farms Mall, and the DMV. A slideshow of the images was created and set to a Grammy-Award winning song "Just Like That" by Bonnie Raitt, who generously gave us the rights to use her wonderful song about organ donation. Ms. Raitt also invited us to her concert in Bridgeport in June, where we hosted an awareness table, and she subsequently made a donation to DLC from her "Just Like That" tour.

We held another unique and memorable event called "Jump for Julia" in honor and memory of Julia Bruno, who became a donor hero at age 17 and saved five people's lives. We invited her heart recipient from Michigan to surprise the family. In a room of 100 of Julia's friends and family, Jonathan and his 17-year-old daughter Jace walked in with a bouquet of sunflowers, Julia's favorite flower. The Bruno family heard their daughter's heartbeat again for the first time in 5 years. For the family, it was a healing part of their grief journey.

Though much more happened throughout the year 2024, I wanted to highlight the personal touches and creativity we used to make the mission of organ and tissue donation in Connecticut successful.

On behalf of the Board of Directors and I, it is our honor to fulfill the mission of Donate Life Connecticut. We strive to continue to provide unique and creative ways to educate and increase awareness regarding organ and tissue donation for Connecticut residents and, ultimately, increase the number of lives saved through the miracle of transplant.

"Ordinary Angels" and Donor Meeting

On Valentine's Day 2024, Donate Life Connecticut sponsored a screening event of the film, "Ordinary Angels," inspired by the true story of Sharon Stevens Evans and her efforts to help a young girl, Michelle Schmitt, in Louisville, Kentucky. Hilary Swank plays Sharon, a struggling hairdresser who finds a renewed sense of purpose

when she meets a widowed father working hard to care for his two daughters. With his youngest critically ill and waiting for a liver transplant, the fierce woman single-handedly rallies an entire community to help.

What made the evening even more special was that we were able to surprise one of our board members and her family with meeting the man who gave a portion of his liver to her little boy and saved his life. Lawrence Lewis traveled from his home in Vermont to meet his liver recipient, 5-year-old Raul, and the entire Torres family. Lawrence is a two-time living donor, having also donated a kidney.



34th Annual Erica Grossman Visual Arts Contest

Since 1990, tens of thousands of high school students have participated in Donate Life Connecticut's Annual Visual Arts Contest, helping to further organ donation awareness and promote the DLC mission to more Connecticut communities.

The contest is held each year to encourage high school students to learn the importance of Organ and Tissue Donation, giving the student a personal perspective on the importance of the message of Donate Life CT. The 34th Annual Erica Grossman Visual Arts Contest winners were honored at the Hartford State Capitol building in May.











Flag Raising

Donate Life flags serve as a display of unity, remembrance, hope, and support while raising awareness and honoring those touched by donation and transplantation. During National Donate Life Month (NDLM) each April, Donate Life flags are flown across America as a nationwide celebration honoring donors, recipients, and waiting patients. To date, more than 50,000 Donate Life flags have been raised!

Transplant Games & Transplant Team of CT


The Transplant Games have a rich and memorable history of bringing together a community of individuals touched by the miracle of donation and transplantation for more than 30 years.

The Transplant Team of CT is managed by DLC Board Member Joanne Pinto. This group of transplant recipients, donor families, living donors, caregivers, family, friends, and professionals are all connected to organ, eye and tissue donation. Transplant Team of CT has two main programs, the Awareness Program and the Showcase Program.

Through the Awareness Program, they participate in various events throughout the year, inspiring and empowering those to spread the word about giving the gift of life. One of the greatest gifts a donor family can receive is to see recipients living a full and healthy life. Recipients honor their donors, donor families, or living donors by promoting the success of transplantation through health and fitness.

The Showcase Program allows members to represent Connecticut at the Transplant Games of America held every two years somewhere in the US. They gather with over 5,000 other people from every state in the country to showcase how well donation and transplantation works. It's about being part of a wonderful, close-knit group of people who truly understand the meaning of Donate Life; who are there to support each other in times of sadness and times of celebration.

Attendees enjoyed small plates by local chefs, an open bar, specialty cocktails, music, a silent auction, caricature drawings, a candy bar, and luminaries.


Dr. Cary Caldwell and his wife Karen established the Susan Katz and James Salatto Memorial Fund and matched all contributions to the fund throughout the event.

Blood Drive

On the day before Thanksgiving, Donate Life Connecticut teamed up with the American Red Cross to hold a blood drive - Share a Slice of Life. Organized by Board Member and American Red Cross employee, Megan Serke, the drive emphasized the importance between organ donation and blood donation.

For an organ transplant recipient to receive the gift of life from a generous donor, the transplant center needs the correct blood type to support the




procedure. Thanks to the generosity of blood donors, it is rare that someone receives the call that their lifesaving transplant procedure cannot be done because the hospital does not have the correct blood type. In 2023, more than 46,000 organ transplants were performed in the U.S., according to the United Network for Organ Sharing. Every day in the U.S., patients in hospitals, surgical centers, and emergency treatment facilities need approximately 36,000 units of red blood cells. Organ donation would not be possible without the selfless act of blood donors who choose to give life.


